


DBHDD's State Fiscal Year 2023 Budget is **\$1,381,037,863**

Gov. Brian Kemp and the General Assembly approved augmented funding in the following key areas for DBHDD:


- 10% increase in funding for Core Outpatient Services
- 2% rate increase for IDD service providers
- 513 new NOW & COMP waivers
- Salary adjustments for nurses & health aides at state hospitals
- Funds to bring hospital beds online
- Expansion of the Georgia Housing Voucher Program
- Sustainability of the Georgia Apex Program
- Transition two CSBs to Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics




Hospital Workforce: Future Focus



- Prioritize filling critical positions to replace temporary staff from Jackson Healthcare and bring beds back online
 - FY 23 budget language set mandate to bring 95 beds online by Nov. 15.
- Maintain focus on protecting patients and staff from COVID-19
 - Interruptions to staffing patterns, availability

Long Wait for Justice: People in Jail Face Delays for Mental Health Care Before They Can Stand Trial

Georgia Health News June 2022 **4,808** Court orders to evaluate defendants for competency to stand trial in FY22

DBHDD is statutorily obligated to evaluate criminal defendants for their mental competency to stand trial and provide care to restore those who are deemed incompetent to stand trial in Georgia (O.C.G.A. § 17-7-130 and § 17-7-131)



Court orders to restore individuals to competency so they could stand trial in FY22

Forensics: Investments and Progress



Average salary increase for forensic psychologists

- Launched Jail-Based Restoration Pilot with WellPath (Cobb County)
 - \$2.5 million in FY 23 budget
 - 20-bed pilot to serve forensic patients
 - Pilot designed based on successful programs in other states (Colorado)
- Engaged nationally renowned expert in forensic services to evaluate DBHDD's system for serving mentally incompetent defendants and provide recommendations for strategic systemic improvements.

Forensics: *Future Focus*

 Ongoing need for Forensic Evaluators in the community and in the hospitals to improve care and reduce wait times and caseloads



FY23 Focus Areas: 9-8-8 Rollout

9-8-8: Current Crisis System Challenges



The Georgia Crisis and Access Line (GCAL) experienced a

in calls, texts and chats during the pandemic (FY21) Call volume, including calls to 9-8-8 and GCAL, is projected* to increase

- Expanded call center staffing
- Expanded use of peer workforce and peer-run warm lines to infuse lived experience and recovery in crisis interventions




- Added GPS functionality for mobile crisis response teams
- Expanded flexibilities for telehealth use to expand reach of mobile crisis response teams in jails, hospitals and schools; considering further expansion in community
- Expanded mobile crisis response team staffing

A Safe Place to Go for Crisis Care


- Enhanced "bed board" function of GCAL
- Future expansion of bed capacity in high-need areas in facilities that are able to ramp up capacity quickly

...resulted in improvements in our crisis system's capacity and response times




9-8-8: Future Focus

DBHDD will continue to monitor the impact of the 9-8-8 rollout on current capacity and will remain engaged with government partners to determine next steps for expansion and enhancement of the crisis system.

IDD Provider Capacity: Progress and Investments

13,061 Georgians served NOW/COMP Waiver 513 additional waiver slots funded in July 2022

Georgians received statefunded family support in FY22

- DBHDD has implemented rate adjustments for NOW/COMP providers, including:
 - Temporary enhancements through Appendix K
 - 5 percent increase in rates across all service lines for NOW and COMP funded in FY 22
 - 2 percent increase funded in FY 23 (pending approval by CMS)
- Family support (flexible funding source for individuals not receiving waiver services)
 - \$667,840 for state funded family support services and \$500,000 for respite services (FY23)
- Building of Crisis Services/Stabilization and Diagnostic Center
 - \$7 million appropriated in FY21
 - Provides crisis support for individuals with IDD and complex needs

Caregiver shortage extends wait for Georgians needing help with intellectually disabled

The Atlanta Journal-Constitution Georgia's system for people with disabilities hits crisis mode

- Rate study underway for <u>all service lines</u> on I/DD waiver services
- Expected completion by January 2023
- Maintain focus on supporting provider network stability
- Priority focus on shortterm and long-term placement solutions for individuals with complex needs


