- ☐ Hope Changes Everything teen summit targets Georgia teens ages 10-17.
- ☐ Due to the rise in suicide deaths among the 10-14 age group, we expanded to include 10–12 year olds.
- ☐ The event brings together speakers, musical artists and resources for hope filled discussions around suicide prevention and mental wellness.
- ☐ This year's summit was held on September 6th at Gas South District and featured the first ever parent experience and programming for youth ages 0-9.



This year we welcomed:

- NFL veterans Doug Middleton, Andre Fluellen and Jarius Wynn to share their personal experiences with suicide loss, grief and resiliency.
- Miss Georgia USA and Miss Georgia Teen USA 2025 discussed body image and self love.


Overall Quality

Sounds of Support

DBHDD OFGSP supported the suicide prevention activities of one of our SAMHSA Garrett Lee Smith grant providers, Viewpoint Health, at their Sounds of Support event.

- Held on September 20th, Sounds of Support was organized by the Newton Rockdale suicide prevention coalition.
- There were over 20 community partner agencies organized on the Covington square providing resources, education and interactive activities.
- More than 100 families were present for the live performances and resources throughout the day.



You Matter

- On September 25th 150 middle school students (6th-8th) participated in the Hancock County middle school *You Matter* celebration organized by the school counselor.
- We provided a fun, interactive discussion-based presentation covering signs of suicide and emotional distress, speaking with a trusted adult, self-worth, and understanding that each student matters.

GCSU 21st Annual CMLA Summit

DBHDD OFGSP continues to support the mental well-being of current and aspiring educators at the Georgia College and State University Annual Collegiate Middle Level Association(CMLA) Summit.



- The student organized summit had over 85 attendees including undergraduate students from local and out of state universities as well as speakers and current educators.
- We hosted a presentation on youth suicide prevention and ended the day with a focus on self-care featuring a live guided meditation.



Substance Use Prevention

Partners in Prevention (PIPP)

- 35 PIPP contracts in 35 counties across Ga
- Providers utilize the Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF) process with Community Workgroups to plan, select, implement, and evaluate evidence-based strategies
- Strategies are used prevent underage drinking, binge drinking, and misuse of other identified community substances
- They use individual strategies such as: Generation Rx/Project Alert/Ask, Advise, and Refer, Sources of Strength, Botvin Life Skills, Too Good for Drugs,...
- And Environmental strategies such as: Positive Social Norms, Safe Homes, Counter Advertising, Social Host Liability...
- From 2020 – 2024 Alcohol & Marijuana age of onset and 30 day reported use decreased and decreased more in PIPP intervention counties than non-intervention counties.

Synar Project

- The Synar State Law prohibits sales of tobacco products to individuals under the age of 21-required in Block Grant.
- Mandated to keep the number of successful illegal tobacco purchases by individuals under 21 to no more than 20% of attempted buys.
- OPS contracts with the Georgia Dept of Revenue Alcohol and Tobacco and the University of Georgia to recruit and train youth investigators to randomly attempt to purchase tobacco products.
- Synar underage buy attempts in 2024 was 9.1%. This year it is below 7% (well below the 20% target rate).
- Year to date, over 4,660 compliance checks conducted across Georgia.

SOR First Responder Naloxone Training Project

- OPS Conducts trainings and Contracts with MCDI and GPSTC for naloxone education/ training to first responders across Georgia.
- Conduct virtual and in-person trainings to Traditional/non-traditional first responders. Provide Naloxone Kits to trainees.
- 737 law enforcement responders trained
- 3,377 distributed
- 233 reversals reported

Substance Use Treatment

Adult Treatment (Residential Services)

36 Residential Treatment Sites

- 7 Independent Residential - 46 beds
- 15 Semi-Independent Residential - 302 beds
- 14 Intensive Residential - 347 beds

Program Capacity

- 85% Independent Residential
- 90% Semi-Independent
- 93% Intensive Residential

Women's Treatment and Recovery Services

- 21 Residential Sites (428 slots) /17 IOP/14 Transitional Housing
- Program capacity - 94%
- Individuals employed/work activity - 99%
- Retained custody - 98%
- Regained custody - 94%
- Drug free births - 74
- Pregnant women served -118
- Women served with MOUD - 173
- Children served 6,175
- Successful Completion - 92%

State Opioid Response Grant

- 24 providers offering MOUD treatment for uninsured/underinsured
- Supports 9 recovery support centers-1 outreach program
- 2 transitional housing- rural areas
- Support naloxone training-distribution
- MOUD programs served over 2,000 individuals annually
- 38,128 naloxone kits distributed
- 103,709 fentanyl test strips distributed
- 1,675 trainings provided in the community
- 2,400 reported overdose reversals

Substance Use Recovery

Certified Peer Specialists

- 26 years of peer trainings
- Trained over 5,033+ Certified Peer Specialist (CPSs)
- 1,454 CPS - Ads (CARES) trained to date

Addiction Recovery Support Centers

- 30 Addiction Recovery Support Centers across the 6 DBHDD regions
- Over 300,000 services provided in FY25
- Multiple providers going above and beyond - work with DFCS and jails

Recovery Warmlines

- ORT supports both the Mental Health and Addictive Disease warmlines
- CARES warmline - October 2024 - September 2025 - 22,104 calls
- There are calls beyond their current capacity
- After hours calls are returned during business hours

Every Georgia School to Receive Opioid Overdose Reversal Kits

Statewide Naloxone Distribution Initiative Launches This Fall

Project Overview: DBHDD, Georgia Department of Education, and Georgia Opioid Crisis Abatement Trust are partnering to **equip every Georgia public school with opioid overdose reversal kits (Naloxone)**. This effort ensures that every school—urban, suburban, and rural—has access to lifesaving medication to respond to an opioid emergency.

Highlights

- **Goal:** 100% of Georgia public schools will receive Naloxone kits
- **Total Schools:** 2,366
- **Total Doses Distributed:** 4,732 (2 per school)
- **Distribution Partners:** 16 Georgia Regional Education Service Agencies (RESAs)
- **Community Engagement:** Regional public events to raise awareness and promote prevention

Rollout Timeline


- **Fall 2025:** Phase 1 Distribution
 - Focus on Metro Atlanta, Southwest, and Central Georgia
- **Spring 2026:** Phase 2 Distribution
 - Remaining RESAs and schools across North, Coastal, and Southeast Georgia

- 12,756 people in communities across Georgia who signed the bus- largest in person outreach effort in Ga history for Substance Use Recovery

2025 Georgia Recovers Bus Tour- Highlights

- **Impromptu caravan:** drivers spotted the Georgia recovers bus, turned around, and followed it to its next stop, creating spontaneous caravans of support. People approached to share their recovery stories, sign the bus, and receive a t-shirt.
- **#Garecovers bus spotting:** Georgia council for recovery staff received texts regularly about Georgians spotting the bus traveling the state.
- **Prayers for safety:** local faith leaders continually showed support for our mission and prayed for safety during their services.
- **Symbol of recovery:** when people signed the bus, most people would sign the start of a recovery journey or the date a loved one lost their life to addiction. The bus embodied the profound dichotomy of addiction: it revealed the devastation it leaves behind while standing as a powerful symbol that recovery is possible.
- **A state united:** from metro Atlanta to Georgia's most rural towns, one truth was clear: no community has been untouched by addiction. Every community is searching for new solutions, programs, and support for families affected by addiction.
- **Georgia council for recovery feedback:** “we saw fear and anger but also hope and joy. The tears were real, yet the smiles promised Georgia can continue to save lives, restore families, and strengthen communities.”

Peer Support and Recovery Programs at Northeast Georgia Health System

Peer Support Programs at NGHS

1. Maternal Peer Support (MPS) Program in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU)
2. Emergency Department Program for Substance Use Disorder (SUD) and Overdose-related Incidents
3. Emergency Department Program for Alcohol Use Disorder (AUD)

These three programs connect individuals to Certified Addiction Recovery Empowerment Specialists (CARES).

Functions as a partnership between NGHS, Georgia Council for Recovery (GC4R), and the Georgia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities (DBHDD) to expand access to recovery-focused care and support for patients and families.



Maternal Incidence

- In 2019, 6.6% of women reported prescription opioid use during pregnancy
- Among these women, 21.2% reported misuse (a source other than a health care provider or a reason for use other than pain).
- 27.1% wanted or needed to cut down or stop using
- 31.9% reported not receiving counseling about how use could affect an infant



What is Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS)?

- A diagnosis that is the result of maternal substance intake while infant is still in utero (illicit or prescribed) (Little et al., 2022)
 - Opioids, benzodiazepines, antidepressants, barbiturates, etc.
- Dysfunction of the central and autonomic nervous systems
- Infants are born withdrawing from substance, not born addicted to substance



NGMC NAS

NGMC NICU first in nation to have NICU Peer Recovery Coaches

Peer Recovery Coach program in NICU established 2018

NGMC Daisy Team Award 2019

Implemented a Family Partnership Agreement in 2020

Implemented Eat, Sleep, Console in 2021

2014 NAS average length of stay: 37.6 days

2025 NAS average length of stay: 5.5 days



Maternal Peer Support: Impact

- **As of October 1, 2025**
 - **1,423** moms supported since 2018
 - **10,577** follow up conversations



Emergency Department Peer Support for SUD

NGMC SUD Peer Recovery Coaching Program (Jan 2018 – current)

- First ED Peer Support Program in Georgia to connect individuals to Certified Addiction Recovery Empowerment Specialists (CARES)
- Partnership: Northeast Georgia Medical Center (NGMC), Georgia's Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities (DBHDD), and Georgia Council for Recovery (GC4R)
- Supports individuals having experienced an opioid overdose or any substance use disorder related incident in NGMC's three campus Eds in Gainesville, Braselton, and Winder

Program Impact Overview:

Initial Peer Encounters: 6,675

Individuals engaged for the first time by a Peer Recovery Coach during hospitalization or ED visit.

Multiple Encounters: 1,459

Individuals with repeat ED visits who were re-engaged by a Peer Recovery Coach—demonstrating both the chronic nature of SUD and the importance of continued support.

Successful Follow-ups: 22,714

Post-discharge contacts made to provide ongoing support, resources, and linkage to care—highlighting the program's emphasis on long-term recovery and relapse prevention.



Emergency Department Peer Support for SUD

Key Insights:

Follow-Up Engagement:

On average, each peer received **~3.4 follow-up contacts**, reflecting sustained engagement post-discharge.

Recidivism Touchpoint:

About **21.9%** of peers (1,459 out of 6,675) returned to the ED and were seen again—demonstrating the need for robust aftercare and perhaps targeted interventions for higher-risk individuals.

Program Reach:

These numbers reflect **significant growth and sustained efforts** over nearly 8 years, underscoring the importance of Peer Recovery Coaches as part of the continuum of care for individuals with substance use disorders.



Emergency Department Peer Support for AUD

Alcohol Use Disorder (AUD) Peer Support Program Launch in 2021

- Provides peer coaching to all AUD peers who present in NGMC Gainesville, Braselton, and Winder
- Also provides medication assisted treatment (MAT) with **wrap-around services** to a limited number of peers each year
 - Wrap-around services: inpatient detox, monthly intramuscular naltrexone therapy, treatment vouchers for sober living, monthly health checkups, coaching sessions, weekly counseling with a Certified Addiction Counselor, case management services, and transportation to and from all program-associated appointments.
- Initially funded with COVID funds through July 1, 2025; received a continuation of a portion of initial funding through Georgia General Assembly, allocated through DBHDD
- ~ **50% success rate** for those who participate in the program.
- Partnership with Georgia Council for Recovery, which collaborates with other sites
