DBHDD Budget Update FY 2025



- Original budget requests as approved by the DBHDD Board
 - >FY25: \$44,479,658
- Funding in the Conference Committee Appropriations Bill
 - >FY25: \$154,629,751
- The Department is grateful for the support it has received and continues to receive from the Governor's Office and the General Assembly.

- Cost-of-living-adjustment for full time, benefit eligible employees
 - > FY25 Funding: \$27,176,955
 - > Includes employees in our network of CSB's
- Waiver funding for individuals with IDD
 - > FY25 Funding: \$11,722,994
 - > Annualizes waivers funded in FY24 and funds 100 new waivers for FY25
- Funding to operationalize the IDD Crisis Services & Diagnostic Center
 - > FY25 Funding: \$3,194,724
 - > Includes the outpatient clinic and true-up funding for the crisis services center

- Funds to staff and operate a forensic step-down facility (Operation New Hope)
 - > FY25 Funding: \$3,218,210
 - Operation New Hope will be in the Savannah area
- Funding for a new jail-based restoration program
 - > FY25 Funding: \$1,993,384
 - > The program will be in Dodge County
- Expansion of jail-based restoration programs
 - > FY25 Funding: \$500,000

- Funding for 1 new BHCC
 - > FY25 Funding: \$9,481,532
 - > Will help address the needs identified in the statewide crisis bed study
- Annualized funding for 3 BHCC's
 - > FY25 Funding: \$6,599,785
 - Annualizes facilities in Fulton County, Augusta, and Dublin
- Fully funds the IDD and BH Rate Studies
 - > FY25 Funding for IDD: \$79,901,675
 - > FY25 Funding for BH: \$26,658,091 (state funded services and state match)

Budget Instructions AFY 2025 & FY2026



- Looking ahead to the Amended Fiscal Year 2025 and Fiscal Year 2026 budgets, Georgia will continue to prioritize conservative fiscal management.
- This will ensure that the state can meet its ongoing financial commitments and plan for sustainable future growth.
- Therefore, state agencies should plan to maintain current Fiscal Year 2025 spending levels for both the Amended Fiscal Year 25 and Fiscal Year 2026 budgets.
- DBHDD's proposed submission will comply with these instructions. We remain in conversation with OPB regarding current economic realities and the impact of growing demand on our system and workforce, particularly in regards to Forensic Services.

- As noted on the previous slide, DBHDD is in conversation with OPB regarding several, major agency priorities
- These include:
 - Annualizations of services partially funded in Fiscal Year 2025 such as Waivers, the Child & Adolescent CSU in Savannah, the Dodge County Forensics Facility, and funding for the NOW & COMP Waiver Rate Study
 - New NOW & COMP Waivers in Fiscal Year 2026
 - Expanded Forensic Services capacity
 - An additional BHCC

These conversations do not represent a guarantee of funding and DBHDD's official budget submission will be a flat budget in accordance with the statewide budget instructions.

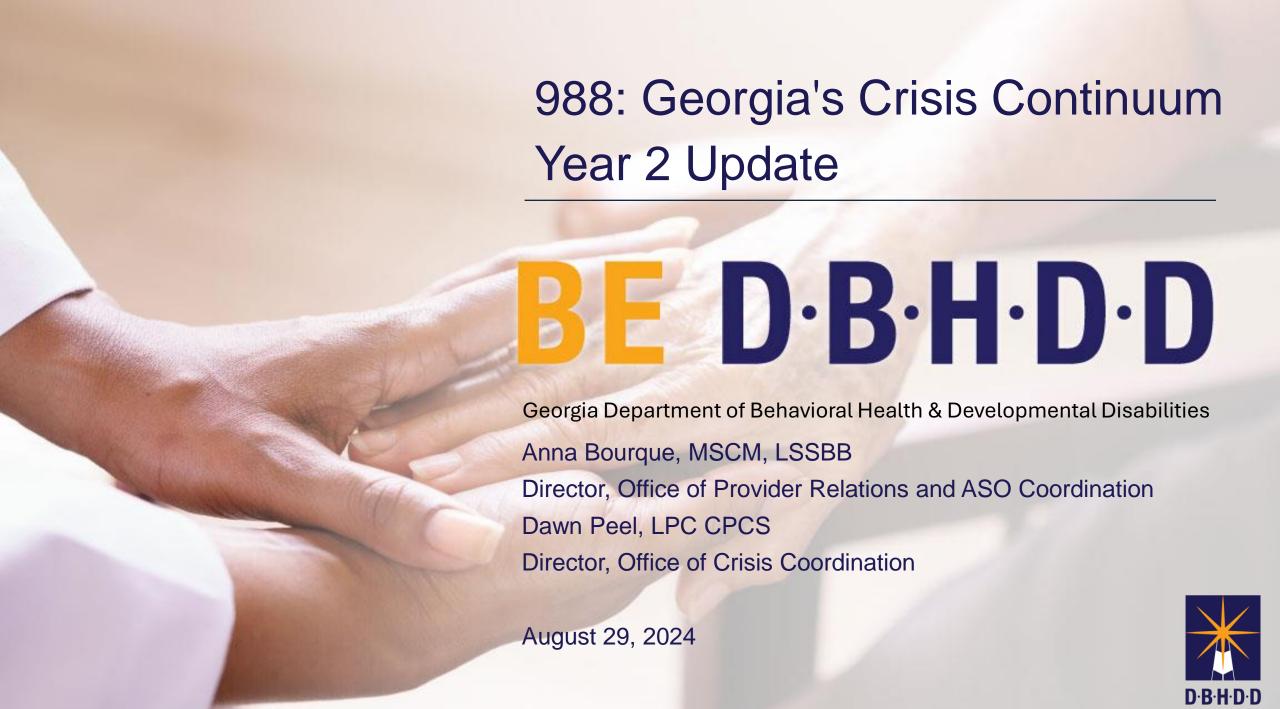

988 Updates

988 Planning and Implementation Timeline



Development

In response to federal mandates. DBHDD developed 988 projections for Georgia and initiated foundational planning to address the impacts to the current crisis system.

Planning

DBHDD engaged stakeholders and partners, built comprehensive plans for the crisis system, and translated plans into tactical activities to prepare for the rollout of 988.

Implementation

The rollout of 988 across the state and country will take time. **DBHDD** will continue to partner with stakeholders and work to expand capacity to meet the demands for crisis services.

In the months and years following the 988 rollout, we will continue to work with the Planning Coalition, Community Partners and other stakeholders to identify opportunities for the evolution of our services across the crisis continuum to meet the needs of Georgians. Some of the key future areas of focus for Georgia include:

- Securing sustainable funding
- Strengthening our workforce
- Adopting new technologies
- Expanding community outreach with Community Liaison

Georgia's 988 Crisis Continuum



Someone to Call

- Crisis calls via 988 and 800-715-4225 (GCAL)
- Available 24/7 for calls, text and chat
- Peer-run warm lines offering callers emotional support, staffed by individuals who are in recovery themselves



Someone to Respond

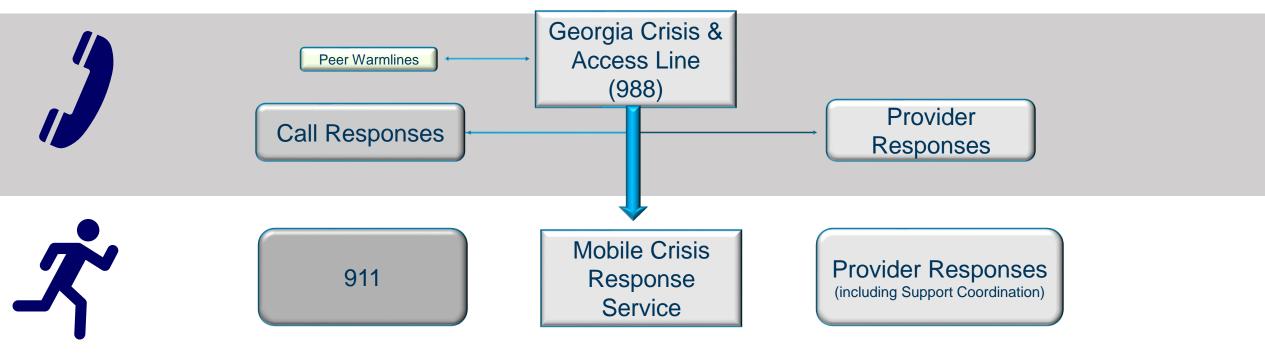
- Mobile crisis available statewide
- Coordinate with 9-1-1/EMS as appropriate
- Outpatient community provider response

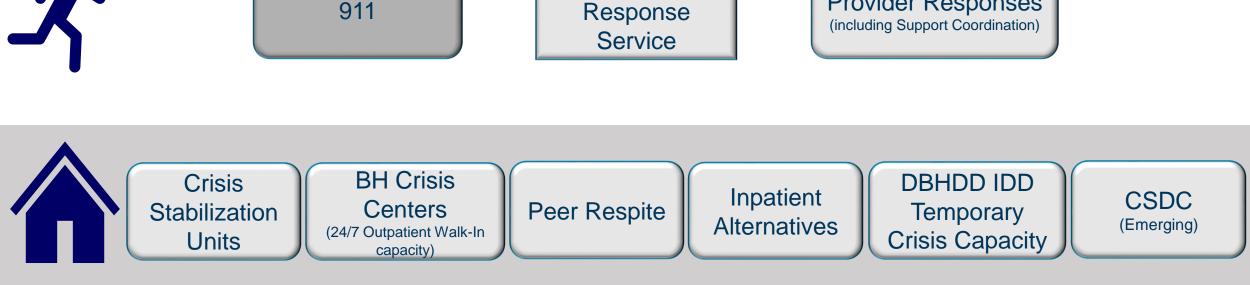

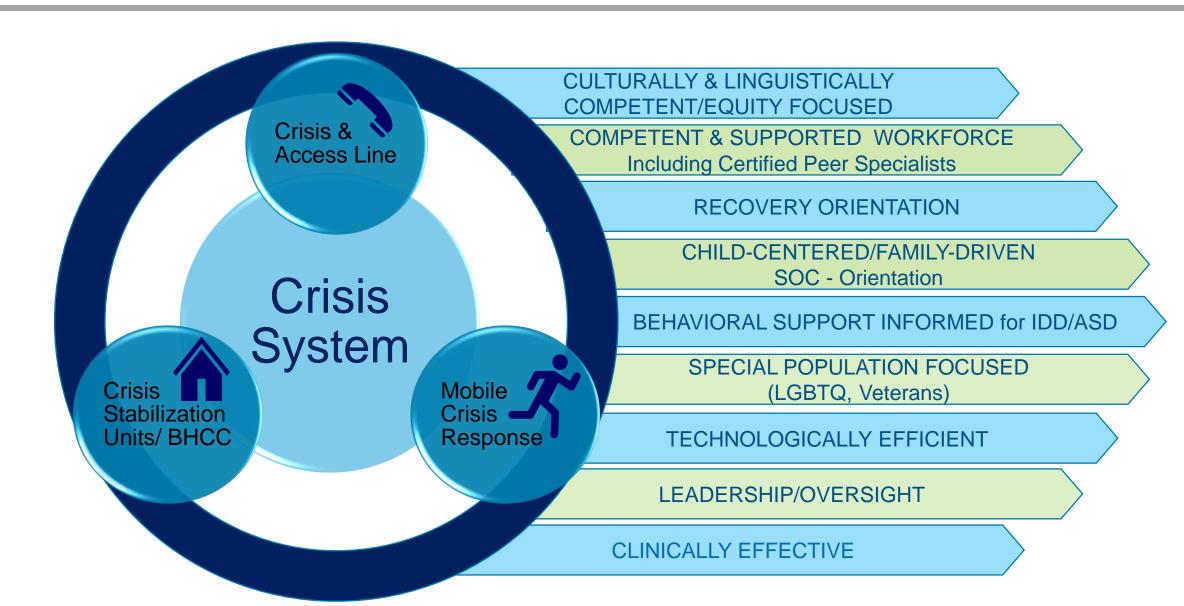

Community-Based Crisis System Principles

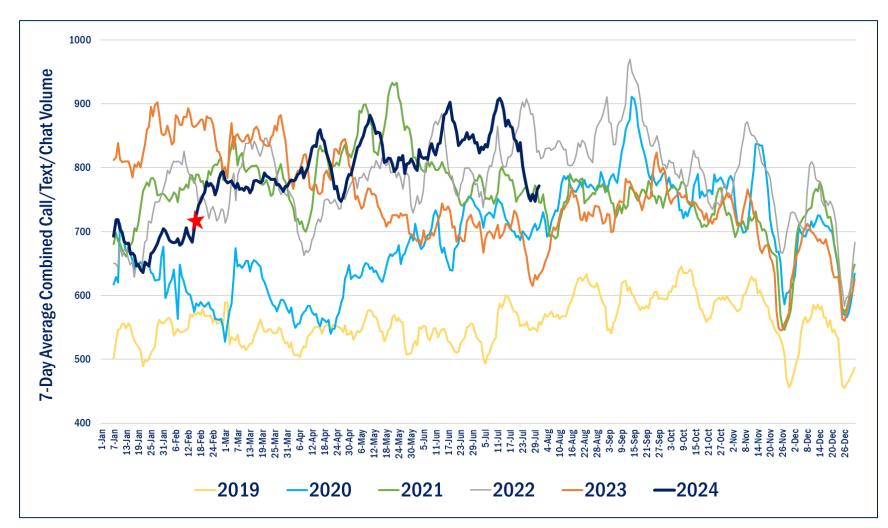


988 Data

Total Calls, Texts and Chats Received: Including 988 T/C

7-Day Rolling Average Year Over Year, January 2019 - July 2024





- Year over year graph shows the seven-day rolling average for GCAL/988 volume, including Georgia's 988 texts/chats.
- Carelon began receiving Georgia's 988 texts and chats on February 15, 2024.
- All FTE positions were filled by March 15, 2024.

Monthly Average *May-July 2024*

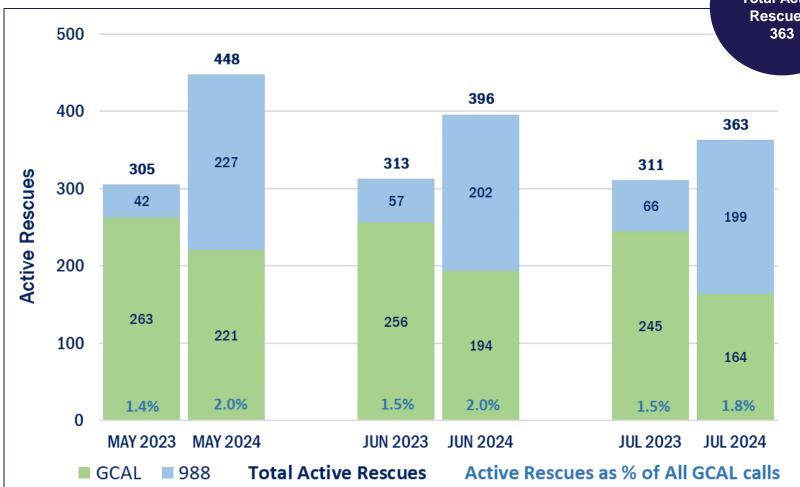




- ASA remains well under the target of 30 seconds.

Monthly Total *May-July 2023 vs. May-July 2024*



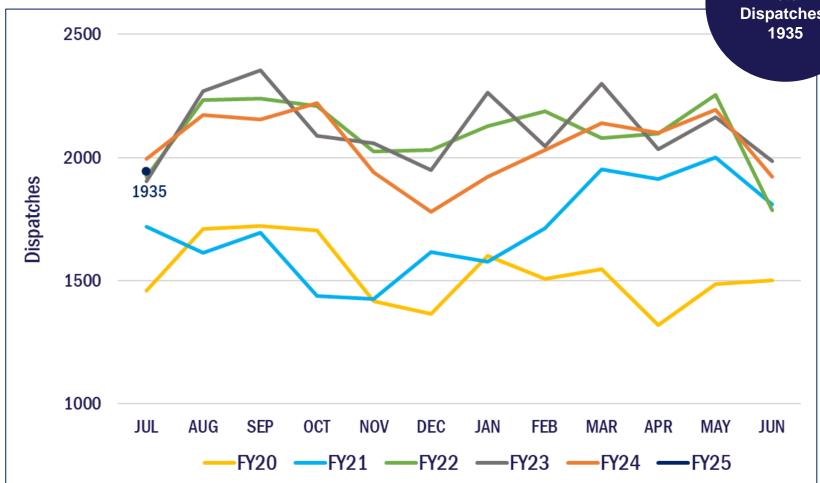


July 2024 Total Active Rescues: 363

- The total number of active rescues has decreased month over month in 2024 but increased year over year.
- The percentage of GCAL calls that resulted in active rescues remains in line with the national average (approx. 2%).

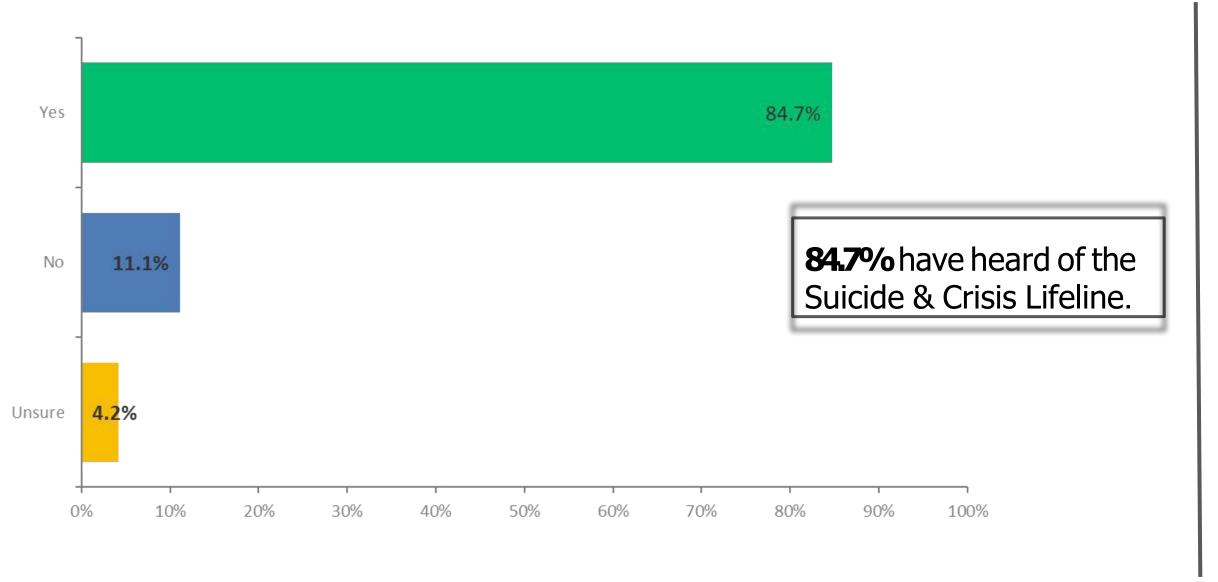

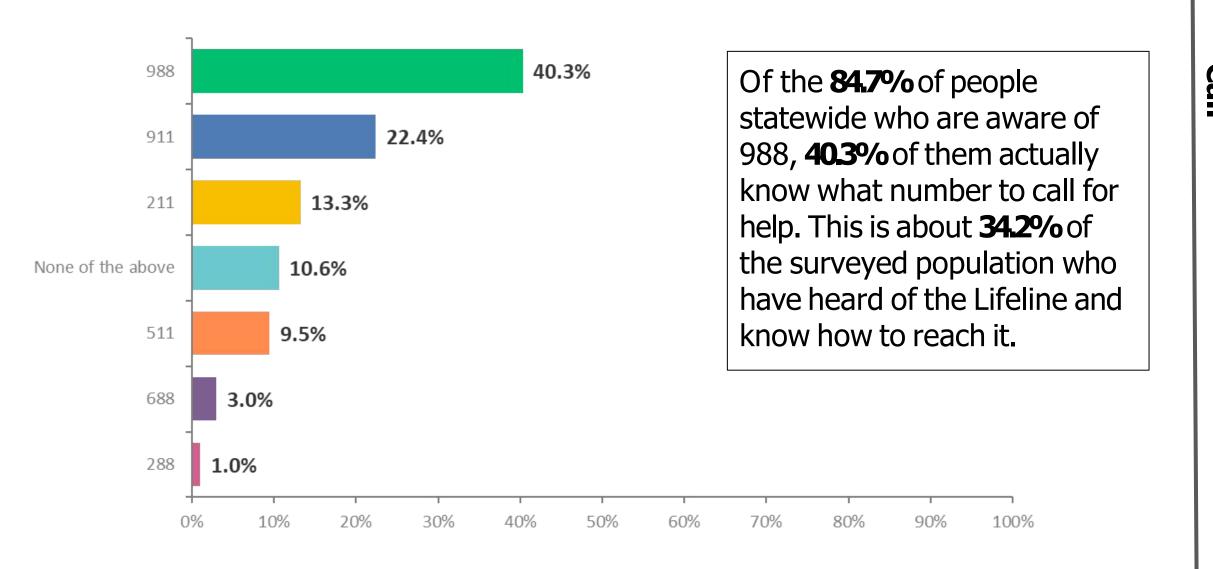

Have you heard of the Suicide & Crisis Lifeline?



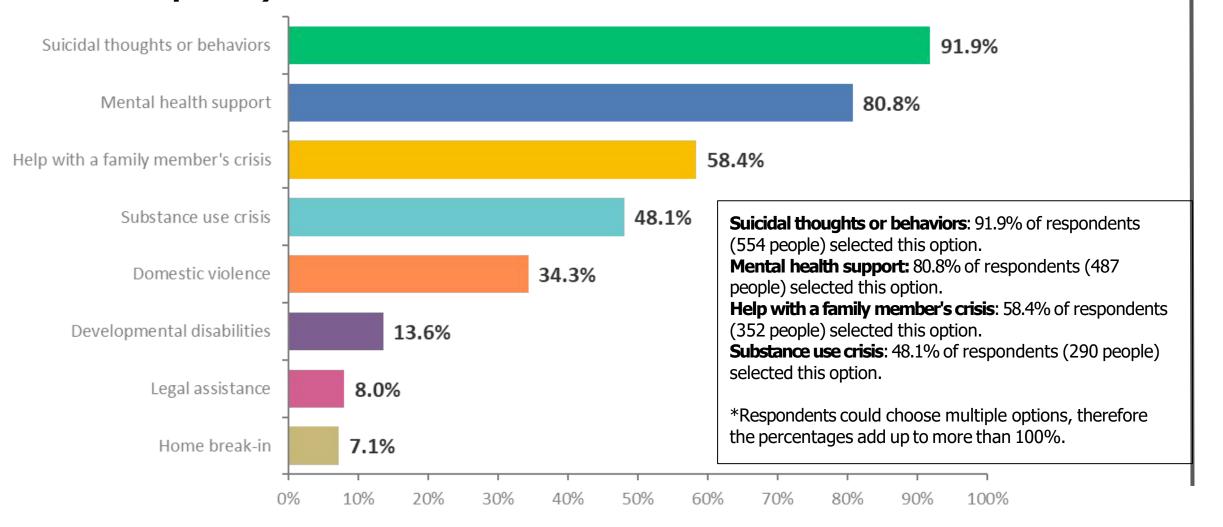
Which of these numbers can you call or text to reach the Suicide & Crisis Lifeline?
