Georgia Recovery Project

- FEMA-funded, SAMHSA-informed Crisis Counseling Program grant that provides supplemental mental health funding in the wake of a disaster
- Supports Georgians with emotional disaster-related needs brough on by the COVID-19 pandemic
 - Non-therapeutic mental health support with links to more intense support as needed and referrals to community resources



Key Concepts

The CCP model is:

- Strengths-based
- Anonymous
- Outreach-oriented
- Culturally aware
- Conducted in nontraditional settings
- Designed to strengthen existing community support systems
- Based on an assumption of natural resilience and competence



Key Concepts


Traditional Treatment

- Is office-based
- May involve diagnosis and treatment of mental illness, as well as identification of strengths and coping skills
- May focus on longer-term issues
- Validates experiences associated with distress that has brought the person to treatment
- Keeps records, charts, case files, etc.

Crisis Counseling

- Is home- and community-based
- Involves identification of strengths and coping skills
- Counsels on disaster-related issues
- Validates common disaster reactions and experiences
- Does not collect identifying information





State Opioid Adapted Response (SOAR)









- Partnership among DBHDD, Georgia Public Safety Training Center (GPSTC), and Georgia Public Broadcasting (GPB)
- 2. 4-hour interactive training with three video segments; officer safety, de-escalation techniques, proper administration of Narcan to reverse overdose
- 3. Participants completing the training receive free Narcan and can receive additional kit if they inform DBHDD of reversal attempts

State Opioid Adapted Response (SOAR)

Goal

Provide opioid-related trainings to law enforcement officers across Georgia to safely respond to opioid related crises.

Trainings include:

- ✓ building effective relationships among officers and communities to increase awareness and prevent substance abuse
- √identifying symptoms of opioid use
- ✓ using conflict de-escalation tactics during encounters with individuals who may be using substances
- ✓ methods for protecting themselves from accidental exposure
 to dangerous opioids, particularly fentanyl
- ✓ Proper use of Narcan to reverse overdoses and SAVE LIVES
