Youth Certified Peer Support

- Building on the existing foundation
 - Child and Adolescent State Infrastructure Grant (CASIG)
 - Highlighting the "Youth Guided" philosophy in documents and incorporating the language in daily communication
 - State started thinking about including the youth to inform decision making
 - But how?
 - Engaging youth requires a different approach
 - Inviting them to the table to do what?
 - Began thinking about cultivating youth leaders
 - Investing in conferences which promote leadership and impact policy
 - Avoid the token mentality

Youth and Community Based Alternatives for Youth (CBAY)

Original Waiver (9/08)

Amended Waiver (4/11)

- Peer Service was based on the adult model
- Only available to those who chose self-direction
- Had to be 21 to provide the service
- Did not have to have experience to provide the service
- Linkage-based service

- Peer Service is revised based on the peer-to-peer model definition from the national level
- Available to all youth
- Have to be 19 years of age to provide the service
- Have to have experience in the system to provide the service
- Resiliency based service

Youth and Healthy Transitions Initiative (HTI)


- In 2009, SAMHSA awarded 7 HTI grants and Georgia was a recipient.
- Target population: 16-25 year olds with behavioral health challenges
- State local partnership
 - Local pilot site in Savannah: Implement service delivery program utilizing the TIP model.
 - State: Create policy/system change informed by learning from the pilot site.
- TIP- Transition to Independence Process model developed by Dr. Rusty Clark

HTI (continued)

- Pilot site uses Transition Facilitation Coaches to assist young people in meeting their self identified goals.
 - Also have a Youth Coordinator and Family Liaison on staff in Savannah.
- Initial State Perspective
 - Create a peer support system; identify and grow program graduates to become Certified Peer Specialists.
 - Create a specialty certificate for working with youth and young adults.
 - Goals have somewhat changed
 - HTI is interested in pursuing and partnering to build the youth certified peer specialist certification and curriculum
 - CHIPRA has become a partner with HTI
 - Parent Peer
 - Youth Peer

CHIPRA

- PPT Goal # 5: Develop network of credentialed Parent and Youth Peer Support Specialists
 - Identification of targeted workforce
 - Build certification and curriculum
 - Develop statewide payment mechanism
 - Modify standards and policies to support use of new workforce
 - Identify facilitator/consultant to help guide the work
 - "Tilling the soil" strategy
